



#### **Bird Notes December 2019 by Cliff Cooper**

First of all, I have an apology to make. In last month's notes I mentioned a bird we had seen at Cley; for some reason I typed this as a red necked diver when it should have been a red <u>throated</u> diver. To make matters worse, there is a bird called red necked grebe which is broadly similar to the diver and could possibly have been on the sea at that time. Sorry about that, even though I am just a little disappointed that nobody contacted me to point out the error- does this mean that nobody actually reads these notes?

Bird migration came up in conversation recently, along with the fact that we really know so little about how, and sometimes why, these migrations take place. Some birds, like fieldfares and redwings, make their long journeys at night and it is believed that they do so using the stars as guidance for the direction of flight. Also, there is a theory that the birds can sense the magnetic field of the Earth so they can navigate using magnetic north as a guide. Other birds, such as swallows and martins, make shorter daytime journeys-stopping off regularly to feed and rest. These journeys can take weeks as they commute between here and Africa. The parent martins leave us to start on this trek before their young. They are going back where they came from, but how on Earth do the young birds know where to go or even what route to take? Geese and swans adopt a different policy; they climb high into the atmosphere and undergo tremendous flights as they make their journey in one go.

We often hear about murmurations of starlings as they swirl together before diving down to ground to roost. Some days ago we witnessed rooks doing something very similar first thing in the morning near Rectory corner. There were hundreds of them, tightly packed together as they tumbled and twirled through the sky, only to rise up and do it all again. That must have just been for the fun of it!

#### **LAWSHALL GARDEN CLUB December 2019**

The weather has changed and winter has now set in. Shall we all sit indoors in front of a warm and welcoming hot fire? Tempting as it sounds; there are still some things to be getting on with in our gardens. December is the month for pruning, protecting and insulating. Now is the time for pruning ornamental and fruiting woody plants. Deciduous trees and shrubs can get your attention now as it is easier to see what you are doing. Remove any dead or diseased wood or crossing branches, trying to cut back to a joint wherever possible. It could be that your plant is simply taking up too much room now. Trim it back slowly being sure to step back occasionally to check that you are not over doing it. It is never wise to rush these things. Lighter pruning will give you a much more satisfactory result than heavy lopping. The heavier you prune, the stronger the re-growth will be which will defeat the object of achieving the shape you desire.

If you have access to a shredder, consider shredding the cut off sections for use on the compost pile. It is worth putting the shredding to one side for adding to grass cuttings next year. They will rot down better this way. Obviously any diseased sections should be discarded or burned where possible. New trees, shrubs or climbers can be planted this month too, provided the soil is not frozen or waterlogged. Fruit trees and bushes would benefit from a spray of winter wash to deter and prevent pest and disease problems that would affect your plants next year.

If you have pots that are not frost hardy, wrap them in bubble wrap or fleece to protect them from heavy frosts. It is a good idea to move some pots and plants into your greenhouse if you have one. Bay trees in pots would benefit from being moved into a greenhouse or a sheltered part of the garden. If like me, you love Salvias, you can protect these too. I have tried leaving my Salvia Amistad out over winter without success so this year I will dig some up and place in pots in my greenhouse. If they are still in flower, water them to keep the soil moist. Reduce watering once the flowers have gone and they should last the winter ready for replanting in the spring.

Other jobs to get your garden through the winter months include making sure your tools are cleaned and stored safely and clearing any leaves from lawns and from the tops of pots to prevent disease damaging grass and plants. Cover beds with good compost, manure, fleece etc., to ready them for whatever you wish to plant in the New Year.

Finally, enjoy your gardens as much now as in the summer. Let the birds enjoy them too by keeping feeders well stocked and not allowing ponds to freeze over completely. Our garden club meets at the Lawshall Village hall every other month and we are looking to add other events to our schedule for 2020 so watch this space for details. **We would love to see you at our club**. A very happy Christmas and great new year to all of you.

## From 'The Archives' ~ December 2019 Family Life in Lawshall Recollections of Maureen Downes nee Lysaght

In the 1930s, at the time of the Depression, my parents, Gladys and Roland Lysaght moved from Rochester in Kent to Suffolk. My mother had recently had a miscarriage, my father was out of work and my grandfather lent them the money to purchase the Village shop at Lawshall which also had about an acre of land. (This was the shop opposite the School) It was thought that with the shop and the land for cultivation they should have enough to live on. They enjoyed life in the village. My father sang in the church choir and my mother gave singing lessons and played the piano in the Village Hall. I was conceived shortly after their arrival in Lawshall and was born at 28 weeks at our house in The Street. I was told that the village nurse kept me alive on goat's milk.

My first memories are of Sid the milkman, our chickens, the Village Hall and our three-seater toilets at the bottom of the garden. The toilet shed had three buckets under a shelf with three different sized holes. The smallest one was for me.

The contents of the buckets were emptied onto the vegetable garden and I remember rhubarb, parsnips and even potatoes growing there. Further up the garden were gooseberry bushes and there was a cherry tree and a plum tree in the chicken run. Apparently, the plum tree produced diarrhoea in the chickens, but I found the chicken food quite tasty.

I enjoyed playing with the other local children, but my mother was not too happy when she found them bathing me in cold water during a game of mummies and daddies. I couldn't run as fast as the others and on one occasion was stung by a host of furious wasps whose nest had been stirred by the older children. My mother said I had 113 stings although I don't remember the pain, only crying loudly, and my mother soothing the red marks with a lotion. As children, we were uninhibited and wandered everywhere throughout the village as neighbours would always report back to my mother on my whereabouts. We went to the fields with the harvesters as they cut the corn and left a small square area of the harvest uncut in the middle into which all the rabbits of the field hid. There was no escape for the rabbits. The men stood outside the small square and shot the rabbits as the last of the harvest was cut and the rabbits chose to make their escape. I remember dragging home a large rabbit over the field and along The Street and a man coming later to collect sixpence from my mother for the rabbit. Our dog also brought home food though usually this was thieved from a neighbour's kitchen.

In our attic were trays of eggs which hatched into tiny chicks and at the bottom of the garden we kept rabbits which my mother disembowelled and skinned. The chickens too had to be plucked after their necks had been wrung and I remember once being chased round the garden by a cockerel with its head half cut off.

My mother ran the shop whilst my father obtained employment in Bury St Edmunds and also ran the local taxi service.

I went to church at an early age as I liked singing, though on one occasion my mother was asked to keep me at home as the whoops from my whooping cough kept interrupting the Rector's service. I also remember attending a wedding for, I think, the Marquis of Milford Haven. For such occasions we had been tutored at school in etiquette and the boys were told to touch their forelocks or doff their caps whilst the girls had to curtsey.

I went to school at three which was the earliest age a child could be accepted. There were three classrooms at the school. One for the 3 to 8 year olds, another for the 9 to 12 year olds and the end room housed the older children. It was in this room that we assembled as a school. The 3 to 8 year old classroom was large with a boiler to one side surrounded by railings next to which our one third of a pint bottles of milk were put each day. We drank these at playtime and then raced outside to play. I had a few scrapes at school; my head was accidentally cut by a boy with a penknife and my knee was scarred when I fell on the gravelly surface fighting over a bicycle tyre, but I enjoyed my time at the local school.

My father would take me to the cinema in Bury St Edmunds and I remember seeing a film about a lady boxer and thought I would like to do that when I grew up. Other outings with my father were long walks in the countryside. Once he took me to the Red Barn where a young lady had been murdered and her story is told in the museum in Bury St Edmunds where a book made of the skin of her murderous lover is displayed.



## Citizens Advice Sudbury & District Top Tips for Safe and Savvy Consumers on Black Friday or for Any Seasonal Shopping.

In the last year, Citizens Advice consumer service has dealt with almost half a million consumer-related issues like faulty washing machines, undelivered parcels and fake designer goods. Over 50,000 of these were during November 2018, by far the busiest month for the consumer service.

Black Friday (29 Nov) and Cyber Monday (2<sup>nd</sup> Dec) mark the busiest shopping weekend of the year. With the sales just around the corner, Citizens Advice Sudbury & District is guiding consumers on how to buy and budget smart. Even though the prices are reduced, your consumer rights are fully protected.

#### If you change your mind about a purchase:

Unless you made your purchase online, shops aren't legally required to accept returns for unwanted goods. Despite this, the shop may choose to have its own returns policy. If it does, they must honour it, so it's worth checking your receipt.

If you buy online however, unless it's bespoke or made to measure, by law you will get an automatic 14-day cooling off period. This starts the day after you receive your order, and there doesn't need to be anything wrong with the item for you to get a refund.

#### If you're worried your purchase is faulty:

If something's gone wrong with an item you've bought, you may be entitled to a refund. You'll have legal rights if you unwittingly bought an item that is broken or damaged, unusable, not what was advertised or doesn't match the seller's description.

You'll have to move quickly, as you only have 30 days to return something that's faulty with the guarantee of getting your money back. Your rights don't end after 30 days, though after this period the retailer doesn't necessarily have to refund you, instead they have the option of repairing or replacing the faulty product.

#### If you're worried about scams:

Be careful not to end up with a counterfeit item. Secure websites should start "https" and have a padlock symbol in the taskbar. Be wary of spelling or grammar mistakes, and companies that don't provide an address.

Also seek out reviews of the seller from other buyers as these can help you decide whether or not you trust the seller. If there is a lot of negative feedback from other people, it's a sign that something's not right.

If you're worried that something you've seen online might be a scam, you can get advice with a Citizens Advice Scams Action adviser by calling 0300 330 3003. Alternatively, you can visit Citizens Advice Sudbury & District at

Keyse House, Acton Lane, Sudbury, Suffolk CO10 1QN.

#### If there's a problem with your Black Friday delivery:

If you bought something to be delivered, it's the seller's responsibility to make sure the item is delivered to you.

If the seller used a delivery company, they should chase the company to find out what's happened to your order - it's not your responsibility.

Check the delivery address you gave the seller. Then contact them and ask where your order is.

#### Tips to stay within your budget:

As well as making sure you're clued up on your consumer rights, don't get roped into buying something you can't afford. Citizens Advice offers the following tips to make sure you're staying within your budget:

Spend time shopping around, researching what deals are on offer and getting advice.

Always look at the total amount you will have to repay when borrowing money. A shorter repayment period may be better than a slightly lower Annual Percentage Rate (APR) amount.

Take care when looking at buy-now-pay-later deals. It might seem like a good option but you'll need to make sure you pay on time in future. If you don't these deals can be very expensive.

Never borrow money on the spur of the moment. Think about payment options beforehand. Work out your budget and stick to it so that you can afford the repayments.

#### Colleen Sweeney, Chief Officer at Citizens Advice Sudbury & District says:

"At this time of year many people may feel the pressure to part with their money.

"It is important that anyone thinking about turning to credit or taking out a loan to help pay for purchases understands the full costs involved and if they can actually afford to pay it back.

"If you are struggling with your finances, it is important to do something about it as soon as possible. You can get free debt and money advice from Citizens Advice to find a way forward and avoid spiralling debts."


