

Bird Notes by Cliff Cooper January 2021

The middle of December during one of the wettest times I can remember, with a Covid pandemic thrown in for good measure, is probably not the best time to attempt to write about exciting bird activity; yet there is always something of interest if you are prepared to look for it.

Last week I was walking the dogs in Golden wood when I heard long tailed tits calling to each other as they travelled through the trees in search of food. As they seemed to be coming in my direction I just stood still and let them come. A flock of about twenty of these ridiculously long tailed birds passed within two



metres of me, unaware of my presence. Following this flock on its meandering course through the wood were tits of two other species – blue tit and great tit. There was also a rather bright looking male chaffinch tagging along to see what food the tits would find. This certainly brightened up my day!

Similarly, I was walking down the waterlogged fields and stopped to admire a male yellowhammer, perhaps not at his summer canary-like best but beautiful nonetheless. As I stood there, a small flock of linnets flew up into the topmost branches of the hedge in front of me. They must have been down on the ground on the very wet ploughed land to the side of the path, yet I had not spotted them. For a few moments the light was good enough for me to see the lovely diffuse shades of pinky red on their breasts before they all flew off together, chattering away as though suddenly startled by something.

So there we are, nothing earth shattering but something to remember during these gloomy days. Hopefully things will improve rapidly at the start of this new year.

Census 2021 will provide a snapshot of modern society

Households across Lawshall will soon be asked to take part in Census 2021.

The census is a once-in-a-decade survey that gives us the most accurate estimate of all the people and households in England and Wales. It has been carried out every decade since 1801, with the exception of 1941.

It will be the first run predominantly online, with households receiving a letter with a unique access code, allowing them to complete the questionnaire on their computers, phones or tablets.

"A successful census will ensure everyone from local government to charities can put services and funding in the places where they are most needed," Iain Bell, deputy national statistician at the Office for National Statistics, said.

"This could mean things like doctors' surgeries, schools and new transport routes. That's why it is so important everyone takes part and we have made it easier for people to do so online on any device, with help and paper questionnaires for those that need them."

Census day will be on March 21, but households across the country will receive letters with online codes allowing them to take part from early March.

The census will include questions about your sex, age, work, health, education, household size and ethnicity. And, for the first time, there will be a question asking people whether they have served in the armed forces, as well as voluntary questions for those aged 16 and over on

sexual orientation and gender identity.

Results will be available within 12 months, although personal records will be locked away for 100 years, kept safe for future generations.


PASSAGE THROUGH ASSAM AND BEYOND part 5 by Leanne Hornby

Despite the difficulties and restrictions imposed because of Covid-19 we were still able to run two 'skeleton' work parties

of six volunteers each during December. Coppicing went ahead over two subsequent Sunday morning sessions; the teams sorted the cordwood timber and created habitat stacks using the smaller branches. These stacks provide

an important element to the diversity of the woodland and although they tend to rot down quite quickly there is an everchanging pageant of wildlife associated with them. In the meantime, the remaining trees have space to flourish without



competition from their rivals and the unshaded ground will become covered with plants and their associated wildlife. The coppiced trees will, of course, sprout and provide a shrub layer beneath the remaining timber trees.

Winter is the traditional time for hedge-laying, so this will be carried out during January and February while the hedgerows are bare of leaves and the berries already eaten by birds. Some volunteers now have good hedgelaying skills. However, it is most likely that restrictions on numbers attending work parties will still apply so we may not be able to invite those who might wish to try their hand at this immensely satisfying craft. That will have to wait until next year.

However, it is with great hope that we now look forward to the time when we shall be running full work parties once again, complete with the obligatory and most enjoyable tea and delicious cake break. When that time comes, we might see you there.


Lawshall Pre-School to Lawshall Pre-School. We know that our new friends will soon settle in and we look forward to getting to know them.

LAWSHALL GARDEN CLUB

So, a year that has brought so much misery has finally come to an end. We can hopefully look forward to better times ahead with the circulation of vaccines and enjoy a healthier and happier 2021. January is all about looking forward and planning the year ahead in our gardens. Many of us were able to spend much more time in our gardens in 2020 and have probably come up with new ideas about what we want in the garden this year. This month is all about preparing to make those changes.

First of all, we are in the two most barren months of the year and who knows what the weather will bring. Will it be snow and heavy frosts or are we in for a wet and windy period? It is the weather that dictates what we can do in the garden but one thing we can do, whatever the weather is tidy our sheds and outbuildings and clean the tools ready for using in the spring. Simple jobs like cleaning and sharpening blades on spades,



secateurs, loppers and other similar tools. Lightly sanding wooden handles and perhaps coating with linseed oil. Another simple job is to prepare your canes or other supporting wood by protecting the ends that will be in the ground. This is something often overlooked and yet we all suffer from canes

and supports snapping off in the ground. Simply fill an old tin can with preservative of some kind and stand the ends of the canes in them overnight. It's as simple as that.

If we get snow, make sure to clear it from the tops of greenhouses and fruit/veg cages. It's also wise to clear snow from branches of evergreen trees and shrubs to prevent them from snapping under the weight. It is

also best to stay off your lawns while the are so wet. If you must cross a lawn, dedicate a specific path that you always use which can be repaired easily in the early spring.

Enjoy the plants that produce their magic at this time of year such as dogwoods, witch hazel, winter jasmine and hellebores, among others. Cut the old leaves from your hellebores so that the



flowers stand proud and beautiful in your border. While you do that, picture what you want those borders to look like in the seasons ahead. Write down your thoughts as it is so easy to forget ideas until it's too late. Draw a plan if it helps and research the plants in books or online. January is a good time to start ordering plants, bulbs, corms etc from the numerous online plant retailers.

Plan your veg patch and order any seeds you may need. Check any existing seed packets to see if they are in date and healthy.

January is the perfect time to prune apple trees, fig trees and vines. Fruit bushes can be rejuvenated now and perhaps consider forcing some rhubarb for a delicious early treat. Early seed potatoes can be chitted under cover for extra early baby spuds. If you haven't done so already, move any pots with plants in close to your house to protect them from the elements and check they don't dry out too much if under cover.

Many people advocate winter digging to prepare plots for planting later but beware of digging over sopping wet soil or frozen soil. I prefer to do this earlier in autumn or leave it until spring.

Whatever you do this January, enjoy your gardens. I hope to be able to restart the garden club at the village hall this year so watch this space for updates. A very happy new year to you all.
