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Recycling Centres: Suffolk is set to continue on its path of working towards full capacity at recycling centres after Monday 19 July saw the end to lockdown.

Phase one from Monday 19 July: The one visit per week rule will remain in place, but an extra 3,760 slots will become available per week

- Cars with small trailers will now be able to book a 15 min car slot (750kg max gross weight, single axle and unbraked) and will also be allowed at Haverhill Recycling Centre
- Cars with large trailers will now book a 30 min large trailer/van slot (over 750kg max gross weight, double axle or braked), apart from at Haverhill Recycling Centre due to its size
- Vans without trailers will be able to book at all Recycling Centres (including Haverhill). Vans must book a 30 min van slot
- Vans with trailers are still prohibited from using any of the recycling centres
- Social distancing will be removed from all sites. Cars can park next to each other (as directed by site staff) and restrictions on number of people on walkway/gantry removed
- Staff will be able to assist visitors if requested. (All staff will wear FFP3 standard face coverings when assisting and follow good practice on Covid hygiene)
- More than one adult will now be allowed to unload per vehicle
- Guidance will remain for the public to continue wearing face coverings if possible. Face coverings for staff remain optional except when assisting the public

Phase two from Monday 16 August (In addition to changes in phase 1)

- An additional 4,500 slots will be made available per week, taking Suffolk's Recycling Centres to full capacity (weekly total to 27,422)
- Removal of one visit per week rule for household waste
- Trade waste will remain restricted to one visit per week (to ensure fair usage of the system which is mainly designed for residents' household waste).

Bird Notes September 2021 by Cliff Cooper

On 6th August there was a gathering of some 30 swifts over the village. Clearly these were not all local birds as not more than 6 had been seen together overhead during the breeding time. These would have been migrating birds, heading back to their real homes, and it appears that they took our birds with them; I have only seen an odd solo swift since that day.

The house martins have been a bit more loyal in that they still have quite a considerable presence around the Glebe area well into the second half of August. I suppose that the young birds have stayed around to build up strength for their long journey towards the African continent.

In our garden we have just started seeing two very young blue tits- we suspect they have come from a second brood in a neighbouring garden because our nest boxes were not re-used after a first partial breeding success. There is also a fully grown juvenile blackbird being fed by its father. Of course the starling population continues to rise, with 50 or so calling in for breakfast at our house every morning

On walks around Golden wood we hear the sounds of chiffchaffs and blackcaps calling, and there was even the brief song of a willow warbler



from the newer part of the wood in August, so thank you to all those of you that kept their dogs under control throughout the breeding season.

Despite the very cold and wet spring, and a non- too brilliant summer, the overall picture seems to be that most of our birds haven't done too badly this year. This is a much happier scenario than I was expecting to find after the very poor start to the breeding season and I hope it continues.

Just one sad note; not a single turtle dove was reported anywhere in the village this year.

The Lawshall Trust

There are two trusts in the village administered by the Lawshall Trustees. They each get funds form dividends on investments, which arise as a result of bequests of land and money left to the people of Lawshall throughout its history.

For example the Village Hall was built on "Town Lands" which was left to the village in this way.

The Lawshall Relief Fund this fund exists for the following purpose

"to relieve either generally or individually persons, resident in the ancient parish of Lawshall, who are in conditions of need, hardship or distress by making grants of money or providing items, services or facilities calculated to reduce the needs, hardship or distress of such persons".

We give thanks for the men of Lawshall who in the 16th Century started the Trust for our village.

The Lawshall Trust is still there today for those persons who need help. Over the years there have been many who have needed a helping hand, young people and the elderly.

Also any organisation in the village can ask for assistance, as long as it is village based.

Whatever help is needed, everything is confidential.

Lawshall Garden Club

As September approaches we need to look at what we want to happen over winter and through the next year. Many gardeners don't see this month as the beginning of autumn but as the start of the gardener's new year as it is this month that work begins on planning and preparing for next years displays.

Among the jobs to be done is the lifting and dividing of overgrown perennials. Take a look at your plants now that their flowering is coming to an end, and you will see that some look tired and overgrown with gaps in the middle. I have noticed this with some of my Heleniums, Rudbeckias and Echinacias. Use a fork to carefully lift them and place them on a sheet of plastic. Then divide them into smaller sections, discarding the centre areas that have used up their usefulness. Heleniums will break up easily. Feed the planting area with some decent quality organic matter and replant one of the fresh sections. You will find that you have some left over that you can plant out elsewhere, giving you new plants for free. Water them in well. Avoid this task if there is a heavy frost forecast which can happen at any time through this month and onwards. Let's face it, we don't have a clue what our weather will do these days.

September is also a good month to prepare the ground for laying new turf or seeding a lawn ready for next year. If it stays dry, remember to keep the are well watered. The new lawn will then establish through the winter and spring. If you have a wildflower area, you will need to clear it if you haven't done so already. Rake the area very heavily reducing the ground to almost bare soil and then use this month to scatter wildflower seeds so they can settle in over the winter.

Other jobs for this month include clearing autumn debris to prevent pests and diseases overwintering, netting pond to keep out falling leaves, moving evergreen shrubs if needed, harvesting the last of the courgettes and marrows and lifting the maincrop potatoes and taking hardwood cuttings from roses. This is also your last chance to plant out spring cabbages and onion sets before the frosts.

If you have been growing chillies in your greenhouse or indeed, outside, they should be ripening nigely for picking about now.

The greenhouse will need less watering and ventilation and towards the end of the month, give the greenhouse a thorough clean ready for use over the winter. You can even start to sow some hardy annuals ready for next year.

So, as you can see, September isn't just about tidying up after the summer, it's more about readying everything for the coming year. The first thing that comes to mind about spring is plants grown from bulbs and now is the time to start planting them (except for tulips which need to wait until November at the earliest) ready for a great early display. If you fancy it, why not consider planting some naturalising bulbs in your lawn area such as daffodils, crocus and fritillaries. They will spread over the years and look amazing. Just lift a section of turf and scatter the bulbs leaving them or planting them where they land. Rigid straight lines will not look natural. Ideally, bulbs should be planted at a depth 2 to 3 times the size of the bulb. Pin a section of chicken wire over the area to prevent those annoying squirrels digging up the bulbs before they have time to settle in.

Finally, just a reminder that the first meeting of the garden club is at **7pm on 8th September at the village hall**. A guest speaker has been booked for the occasion.

Membership of the club is just £20 a year or £5 per meeting for guests. We limit non-members to one meeting only. It's a great little club and if you would like to join, just turn up or give me a call on the below number. In the meantime, enjoy your gardens and keep safe and well.

September in Golden Wood: Summer's fleeting visit barely seemed to get underway before autumn's arrival. The cereal harvesting remained at a stand-still along until better weather during the middle of the month. For

wildlife the challenges of a poor summer are enormous during what should be a time of plenty. Our migrant swifts, always early to leave — along with the cuckoo, which is now much reduced in the Suffolk countryside, have long gone on their incredible journeys back to tropical Africa although many will not make it. Happily, our celebrated Suffolk cuckoo, PJ, has made the return journey back to Africa adding an eleventh Sahara crossings to his record.

Despite this summer's cool conditions, all was not lost, and Golden Wood has continued to delight. One area that we don't get to see is the large pond, and although there is a viewing point, it can only be seen from a distance. This pond has taken a very long time indeed to develop since being dug out but now it is proving to be a great area for wildlife.

Apart from the warblers that flit through the sallows all summer-long and the moorhens that tail-jerk across the water, there are now thousands of smaller inhabitants and that is all down to the pond vegetation which has taken around fifteen years to develop. Now, a dip with a net into the cool, clear waters will catch large numbers of wandering snails as well as the aquatic stages of many invertebrates.

At this time of year around the pond there will be common and ruddy darters as well as migrant and southern hawker dragonflies. Throughout the summer there have been four-spotted chasers and numerous smaller damselflies. The photograph shows two common blues resting on 'pickerel weed' or broad-leaved pondweed. All our damsel and dragonflies lay their eggs in the water or on plants in or overhanging water bodies, and the hatched larvae live a long aquatic life compared to their adult stage.

Golden Wood is just large enough to possess considerable diversity because of its coppice areas, maturing trees, laid hedges, open meadows, ponds, and numerous rides. Of course, it still only constitutes a tiny oasis in a wildlife desert and thus can only support a limited amount of wildlife. There is a great need to connect all those other tiny oases, via the margins of our farmland, in order to begin to reverse wildlife declines. Stewardship offers a good starting point but unless it becomes mandatory, we are still working against the grain.

September's work team task on the last Sunday of the month is to cut cordwood, transport the logs to the Foundry site and bag up for sale. Log sales form an important income stream, and the money goes towards improvements in the woodland such as the central gateway which, in future, should be much less muddy during the winter.

Here's hoping for a long Indian summer like 1921 when the horses' hooves were still kicking up the dust as they plodded home after their day's toil at the end of October. That year, of course, it was also a splendid summer!

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Breeding Bird Survey In Golden Wood 2021

Sadly, the 2021 census has been carried out without two members of the team. Both Grenville Clarke and Clive Grimwood have passed away and their expertise in interpreting the findings of the survey has been greatly missed.

There appears to be some development in the breeding population of Golden Wood since the last full census in 2017 (Simon Haffenden did a single-handed census in 2020). Wren and Robin numbers have risen in the interim, while Great Tit nesting seems to have fallen. Conversely, Blue Tit numbers are up.

The "new" northern part of the wood is developing some good, scrubby habitat at its top end while the lower end has grown and thickened; the birds are taking advantage of this opportunity. It has allowed Whitethroats to move in here, along with Linnets that were frequently seen, though we could not prove the Linnets to be actually nesting here yet. Just one Lesser Whitethroat pair was recorded.

Chiffchaffs also appeared to be doing well throughout the wood, and a pleasantly surprising rise in Song Thrushes to four territories was noteworthy. The Garden Warbler is hanging on with just one probable nest, while Willow Warbler, Dunnock, Blackbird, Yellowhammer, and Chaffinch numbers appear stable.

Birds recorded during the survey without any evidence of nesting:

Green and Great Spotted Woodpeckers, Magpie, Goldfinch, Reed Bunting, Kestrel, Buzzard, Fieldfare, and Magpie.

For the purposes of this census, Woodpigeons, Rooks, and Jackdaws were ignored.

Bullfinch and Marsh Tit were notable absentees during the census.

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
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Lawshall Ladies Book Club


However, two ladies absolutely hated it. One had listened to an audio version and played a sample to the Group. The narrator seemed to have a dead flat monotone and would have made the

From the Archives ~ September 2021 HARVEST TIME

Some of you may have noticed that harvest has taken a step back in time at Coopers Farm on Melford Road. Luke Bucksey and Ray Debenham have an impressive array of vintage farm machinery and they have been growing an old type of wheat that will produce suitable thatching straw. The wheat seed used is Square Head Malster. The straw produced by modern varieties of wheat is too short and the straw has to be harvested using the correct machinery for the job. The crop can grow to an impressive height of over one metre, but of course is susceptable to falling down in rough weather. The Reaper Binder below is an International Harvester No.3 and was made in the 1940's.



The first Reapers were machines that simply cut the crop and these were in use as early as the 1830's; before this the crops would have been cut using scythes. From 1872 the Reapers were adapted so that the sheaves were formed. They were tied with string and then 'shocked' into A-shaped conical stooks, resembling small tipis, to allow the grain to dry for several days before the sheaves were collected and threshed.



When the stooks are dried the Threshing Machine takes over, in this case a Ransomes Sims & Jefferies AM 54 Medium No 29145. This machine was manufactured at Ipswich in 1919.





The Threshing Machine removes the seeds from the stalks and husks. The first threshing machine were made as early as the 1700's and would have been powered by hand, then horses then Traction Engines and finally by Tractors. Luke's Threshing Machine has a Lanz Straw Press attached to it, this was made in 1930 in Germany. The additional equipment bales the straw ready for use.

Until recently most straw was baled in square bales but now we see the huge round bales in the fields after harvest. The modern day Combine does all the jobs of the Reaper Binder and the Threshing Machine.

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

AUSTRALIAN WEATHER REPORT

The Aborigines in a remote part of Northern Australia asked their new elder if the coming winter was going to be cold or mild. The weatherman replied "Our satellites have reported that the Aborigines in the north are collecting firewood like crazy, and that is always a sure sign"



A tractor is needed to drive the Threshing Machine and this is a John Deere Model B made in 1947. The green John Deere machinery is a very familiar sight in our fields.

John Deere, born in 1804, was a blacksmith in America who developed the first commercially successful plough in 1837 and founded the company that still bears his name. His father was lost at sea when he was four years old, and he was raised by his mother. As a young man, he won acclaim for his workmanship and



ingenuity as a blacksmith. When the New England economy collapsed in 1836, he followed other Vermonters to Illinois, where he established a blacksmith shop in Grand Detour.



The final photographs in these iconic scenes shows the Allis-Chalmers Model U Tractor which was made in 1942. This is used to pull the trailer with the sheaves that are being loaded onto the Threshing Machine. The Allis-Chalmers company was formed in America in 1901. The photo below shows the Straw Press that is attached to the Threshing Machine to make the straw bales

Lawshall Weather – July

This month was very variable finishing up with figures that were slightly higher all round than last year although cooler than 2019. The rainfall figures are up on last year at the same time but 41mm (exactly half of the monthly total) fell in one day, which was the 25th. Full details are shown below.

As I write this in the middle of August the weather has certainly taken a turn for the worse with temperatures down on August last year. Daily temperature figures for the first 15 days of August this year average at 22.3°c whereas for the first 15 days of August last year the daily average was 28.0°c which represents a considerable difference. Time will tell but very strange things are happening not very far away from us. Southern Europe is having the highest temperatures ever recorded and multiple forest fires are raging in Greece, Italy and Spain. The weather is always the subject of conversation with the British people but one thing can be guaranteed is that we will all be talking about it much more in the future!!
